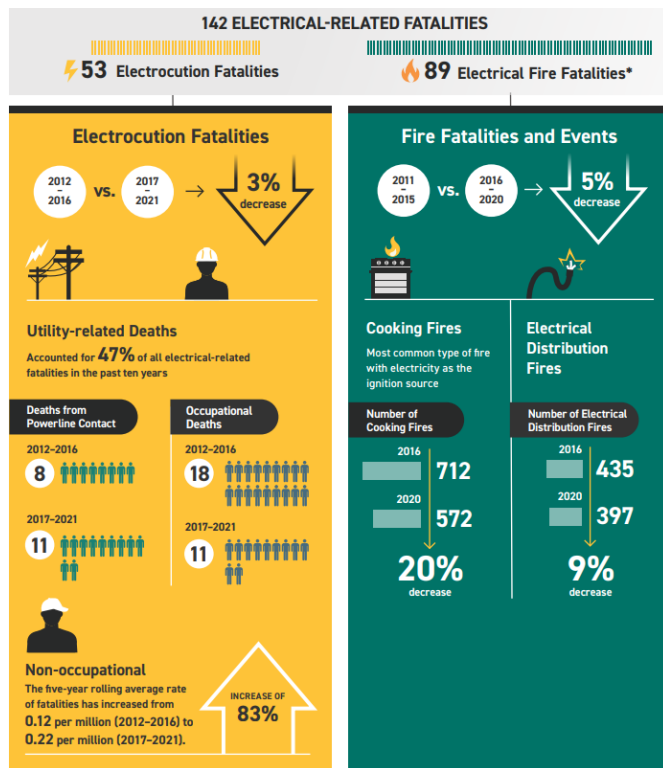
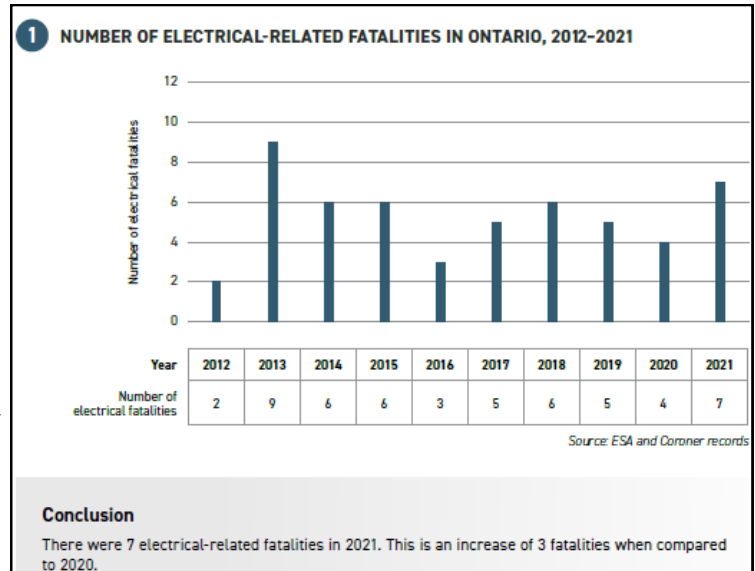


Ontario Electrical Safety Report 2021

The [Ontario Electrical Safety Report](#) (OESR) is an annual report that compiles and publishes electrical safety data, providing a comprehensive collection of data and analysis that helps to make Ontario a safer place to live, work, and play free from electrical harm.

Incidents mentioned in this report are tragic circumstances where people have been injured or killed. By learning from these events, we can prevent these occurrences from happening in the future, together.



The data collected and analyzed through the OESR helps the ESA focus on risk factors and guides our efforts to reduce electrical harms in areas of highest risk.

Although the numbers have increased, the trend rate of electrical-related fatalities per million continues to decrease.

Utility-related electrocutions have accounted for 47% of all electrical-related fatalities in the past ten years.

Electrical trade workers (electricians and apprentice electricians) accounted for 28% of occupational electrical related fatalities between 2012 and 2021 as they were fatally injured on the job when working energized.

Between 2017 and 2021, there were 16 non-occupational electrical fatalities.

Three workers were operating a sausage mixer at JBS Foods' Belleville plant.

To prepare it for cleaning, they were transferring its contents into two-wheel bins located at the outfeed of the mixer. One worker turned on the two-hand control without realizing that another worker was reaching inside the discharge hole, seriously injuring them.

JBS Foods Ontario Inc. failed to ensure the machine had a guard or other device to prevent access to the pinch point as prescribed in S 24 of Reg. 851, contrary to S 25(1)(c) of the OHSA.

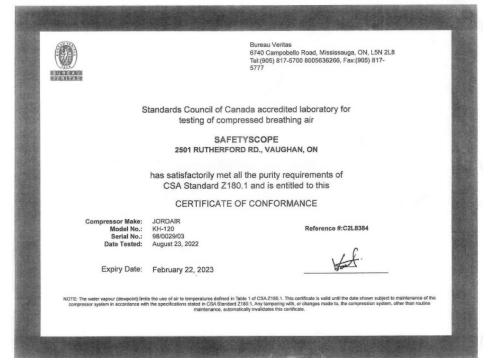
A worker was directed to clean out a hopper for a dust collection system.

Contrary to company policy and training, the worker reached inside to clear the remaining dust and debris with their hand. The hopper was not locked out during the cleaning process as required by the Regulation, and the blades were still turning.

Patheon Inc., a subsidiary of Thermo Fisher Scientific Mississauga Inc., failed to ensure that the hopper was locked-out prior to cleaning, contrary to S 76 of Regulation 851.

Nov 6, 2022 We Fall Back




The end of daylight saving time can leave many feeling fatigued, which can pose safety risks both at home and in the workplace.

Studies suggest that it takes people who work traditional hours several days to fully readjust their sleep schedule after the time change. While it may seem a welcome gift to get an extra hour of sleep as opposed to losing an hour in the spring, there is a physiological consequence to changing our clocks. Evidence suggests that time changes increase safety problems both at work and at home due to sleep deprivation.

When clocks go back in the fall, pedestrians are more than three times as likely to be struck and killed in the hours after 6 pm. Why? Because drivers are fatigued and their focus is diminished, putting pedestrians at increased risk. It stands to reason that any change to sleep patterns and schedules could put shift workers at risk for harming themselves or coworkers in the workplace during operations of vehicles and/or lifting devices.

The following are key changes to note:

- To make the book more user friendly, a new numbering system was added to the layouts and the book appearance was updated to include colour coding to help navigate the topics.
- Introduction of several new layouts for roundabouts, pedestrian and cycling facilities, and High Occupancy Vehicle lanes.
- Addition of a layout table to help users determine the most appropriate table for use within their traffic management plan.
- Implementation of longer tapers to help traffic more safely maneuver the temporary work zone and improve consistency across Canadian jurisdictions.
- Updated information about the use of AFADs including the distinction of regulatory requirements vs guidelines for use.

Preventing Occupational Disease

October is Healthy Workplace Month in Canada. The MLITSD, along with health and safety partners, will be focusing on preventing occupational diseases in different sectors from October to December. The [Healthy Workers in a Healthy Workplace – occupational disease](#) initiative will roll out in two phases:

Phase 1: Compliance support and awareness campaign, October 3 – December 30, 2022

Phase 2: Focused inspections campaign, October 31 – December 30, 2022

The focus of the initiative in each sector will be:

- Construction: asbestos reporting and compliance with the Asbestos Worker Registry
- Health care: occupational dermatitis
- Industrial: silica exposures
- Mining: diesel exhaust in underground mines
- Radiation: ionizing radiation all sectors

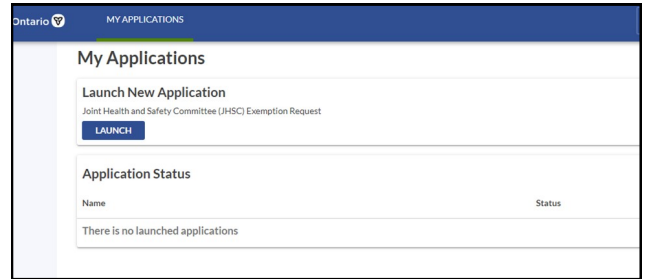
Before you can access worker records, each worker will need to have a SkillsPass™ account and provide you with consent to see their records.

How to Apply for a JHSC Refresher Extension

A health JHSC is an asset to employers to ensure they are meeting their legislative requirements.

It is imperative that all committee members are aware of any changes in the legislation and standards. JHSC Training providers are required to ensure their training reviews all legislative /standards/guideline updates that have occurred in the previous 3 years.



A certified committee member is eligible to apply for a one-time exemption if they cannot complete a JHSC Refresher course within three years. The exemption form can be accessed on the [Ministry of Labour, Immigration, Training and Skills Development data base website](#). The JHSC member would log on using their Skillspass™ email address they provided when they were certified which will generate a email with a link to access the online form.

Applicants who meet all exemption requirements can receive automatic and immediate approval of their exemption request. If granted a one-time exemption, the certified committee member is exempt from having to take JHSC Certification Refresher Training within three years of their last certification completion date, giving them six years instead.

That being said, this should be only used by employers and workers that failed to book training in time and need a small exemption to complete the training, not to avoid it.

JHSC Certification Training Standards & Training Requirements 5-Year Review

This consultation is part of a commitment made by Ontario's Chief Prevention Officer (CPO) to review the Joint Health and Safety Committee (JHSC) Certification Training Program and Provider Standards every five years.

The intent of the review is to ensure the CPO-established JHSC Certification Training Standards and Training and Other Requirements remain effective, relevant, and up to date.

Interested parties may include workers, employers, supervisors, learners, training providers, training instructors, occupational health and safety professionals, committees or organizations representing workers and/or employers and other occupational health and safety system partners who interact with the standards.

Submissions and comments provided to the Ministry of Labour, Immigration, Training and Skills Development (the Ministry) are part of a public consultation process to solicit views on the Joint Health and Safety Committee Certification Training Program and Provider Standards. This process may involve the Ministry publishing or posting to the internet your submissions, comments, or summaries of them. In addition, the Ministry may also disclose your submissions, comments, or summaries of them, to other parties during and after the consultation period.

Therefore, you should not include the names of other parties (such as the names of employers or other employees) or any other information by which other parties could be identified in your submission.

If you do not want your identity to be made public, you should not include your name or any other information by which you could be identified in the main body of the submission. If you provide any information which could disclose your identity in the body of the submission, this information may be released with published material or made available to the public. However, your name and contact information provided outside of the body of the submission (such as that which may be found in a cover letter, on the outside of an envelope, or in the header, or signature of an email) will not be disclosed by the Ministry unless required by law. An individual who provides a submission or comments and indicates a professional affiliation with an organization will be considered a representative of that organization and their identity in their professional capacity as the organization's representative may be disclosed.

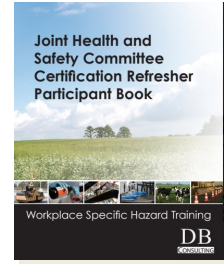
