How Would You Cope?

In January Court Bulletins, a <u>Supervisor</u> and a <u>Forman</u> were separately charged for two different accidents and found guilty under the Occupational Health and Safety Act which resulted in guilty plea's and fines. One was as a result of a fatality and the other was due to a critical injury or a fellow worker.

Nobody goes to work to get injured. And we all truly believe that "it won't happen me". But it does. It is not just employers or corporations who can be charged and have to live with this. It could be you, the supervisor, the lead hand, the Forman: anyone who has charge of a workplace or control over a worker.

The question, "how would you cope?" was not asking you if you could afford the fine or if your reputation could survive the guilty charge.

The question is asking how would you cope with knowing, if you had done something differently, you could have prevented the injury or death of a fellow worker.

Competent Supervisor training is to protect supervisors, protect workers and to protect the employer. Do you, as a supervisor, have enough training? Do you need more training to adequately protect workers?

Court Bulletins Fatalities

Jan 23 Fatality-Alfredo Piluso, the Forman of Road-Ex Contracting Ltd., Fined \$20,000

Road-Ex and a subcontractor were constructing a new driveway as part of a commercial building project. Mr. Piluso was supervising the workers and acting as the signaler for the rock truck operated by a worker employed by the subcontractor. He signalled the operator to haul the load and then turned away from signalling the rock truck to take measurements of the soil grade where the excavator was actively digging. The operator of the rock truck did not see a worker standing in the intended path of travel due to an obstructed view.

By performing other work while acting as a signaller, Mr. Piluso failed, as a worker, to work in compliance with S 104(3) and 106(1) of Reg. 213/91, contrary to section 28(1)(a) of OHSA.

Jan 22 Excavation Fatalities and Critical Injuries - Direct Underground Inc. Fined \$250,000

Four workers were injured, two of them fatally, during the installation of a new underground sewer system a wall of the excavation collapsed.

The investigation found that the excavation wall had a weaker layer of soil present, which was classified as Type 3 per Reg. 213/91. This required shoring or appropriate sloping of the walls to prevent unstable conditions leading to collapse. The investigation also found that there was no engineering opinion on the stability of the excavation wall, and no support system installed for the weaker layer of soil.

The employer failed ensure that the walls of the excavation were supported by a shoring system or appropriately sloped, as required by S 234(1) of Reg. 213/91, contrary to S 25(1)(c) of the OHSA.



Court Bulletins Critical Injuries

Jan 28 Critical Injury - Canadian General - Tower Limited Fined \$175,000

Workers at an emboss station, where layers of material are combined and embossed onto rolls, noticed a defect mark on the finished product.

A worker entered the emboss station, while the machine was still running, to examine the roller surfaces inside the machine and their gloved hand was caught between two counter-rotating rollers. These created a pinch point that critically injured the worker.

The employer failed to ensure the worker was protected from the pinch point, as required by S 25 of Reg. 851/90, contrary to S 25(1)(c) of the OHSA.

Jan 27 Ryan Wilkes, Project Supervisor, The Lake Partnership fined \$10,000

Mr. Wilkes was the project supervisor at the site, which included workers from Mr. Wilkes' company and two framing subcontractors. There were openings in the floor at each level of the building for a planned elevator shaft. The opening to the elevator shaft on the first floor was covered by sheets of insulation made of dense polystyrene, featuring the words "DO NOT STEP.

While a framer was working on the first floor, they stepped onto the material, which did not meet the requirements for a protective covering, covering the opening for the elevator shaft and fell through to the basement floor.

Mr. Wilkes failed, as a supervisor, to ensure that the worker was protected by a guardrail or protective covering as required by S 26.3(2) of Reg. 213/91, contrary to S 27(1)(a) of the OHSA.

Jan 24 Lack of Guarding Critical Injury - Cerelia Bakery Canada Fined \$85,000

A worker, employed by a temporary help agency, was working on the cookie producing line at one of three oven conveyors in operation at the facility.

To rest after prolonged standing, the worker sat on a guardrail parallel to the conveyor. The worker rested one foot on a step platform outside the guardrail and moved their other leg through a 16-inch space between the guardrail and the conveyor to rest their foot on the lower frame of the conveyor. While in this position, the worker lost balance and was injured by a pinch point on the conveyor.

An inspection found that there was no adequate guarding to prevent access to the pinch point from above.

The employer, failed to ensure that the conveyor was guarded to prevent access to the pinch point, as required by S 25 of Reg. 851/90, contrary to S 25(1)(c) of the OHSA.




